
Civil War: Total War

- The Civil War:
- The United States tore itself apart
 - 620,000 Dead and Wounded




Civil War: "A House Divided"

- "A House divided against itself cannot stand."
- I believe this government cannot endure permanently half slave and half free.
- It will become all one thing or all the other."
 - Abraham Lincoln, 1858




Civil War: Who Fought?

- The <u>expansion</u>
 of slavery into the
 western territories.
- Failed <u>compromises</u>




1820: The Missouri Compromise

- Missouri entered the United States as a slave state
- Maine entered the Union as a <u>free state</u>
- No slavery north of the 36° north latitude line
- 12 <u>free</u> States,
- 12 <u>slave</u> States



The Compromise of 1850

- California would enter the Union as a free state.
- The rest of the Mexican
 Cession would vote
 on whether to enter the Union
 as a <u>free</u> or
 <u>slave</u> state.
- The <u>Fugitive Slave Act</u>
 made it a crime to assist
 runaway slaves anywhere in
 the Union.

1854: The Kansas-Nebraska Act

The territory of the Louisiana Purchase was divided into 2:

Kansas and Nebraska

Kansas and Nebraska would vote on joining the Union as a Free or Slave State:

Popular Sovereignty

Violated the Missouri
 Compromise (slavery allowed north of 36 degrees).

1856: Bleeding Kansas

- Violence broke out in Kansas.
- In 1856, pro-slavery groups <u>burned</u> the town of Lawrence, Kansas.
- Abolitionist <u>John Brown</u>
 killed 5 pro-slavery men.
 (Pottawatomie Massacre)
- Over <u>200</u> people died in the violence.

1856: Violence in the Senate


- Representative Preston
 Brooks of South Carolina
 beat with a cane
 Massachusetts Senator
 Charles Sumner in the
 Senate.
- Sumner had made an anti-slavery speech.
- Sumner never recovered from the beating.
- Brooks received only a \$300.00 fine.

1857: The Dred Scott Decision


- <u>Dred Scott</u> sued his owner for his freedom after his owner took him into free territory.
- The Supreme Court ruled that Dred Scott was not a <u>citizen</u> of the United States and could not sue.
- The ruling said that Congress had no right to <u>prohibit</u> slavery in any territory.
- This ruling stunned Northerners.

1859: John Brown's Raid

- Abolitionist John Brown tried to get slaves to rise up against their owners.
- He and his followers broke into a government arsenal (weapons storage)
- Brown was arrested and hanged for <u>treason</u>.
- Southerners were horrified by the attack

The Election of 1860

- The presidential race of 1860 showed how <u>divided</u> the nation was.
- Abraham Lincoln won the election, with no southern support
- Lincoln wanted to stop <u>expansion</u> of slavery into the western territories.
- South Carolina <u>seceded</u>
 from the Union after Lincoln's victory.

1861: The Attack on Fort Sumter

- The Civil War started in South Carolina.
- Confederate troops attacked Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor.
- Lincoln declared the South in a state of <u>rebellion</u>.
- The North and the South were now at war.
