Cato Carter	Texas	Cato was a house slave with nice clothes. One day, a slave was pulling at a mule and needed to be punished. Cato's master gave him a gun and ordered him to kill the slave. Cato begged his master not to make him kill him. He couldn't commit murder, so he and the slave ran away.
Sarah Ashley	Texas	Sarah had to pick 300 pounds of cotton a day and carry the cotton to the gin. If slaves did not get 300 pounds they were whipped. She always got 300 pounds,
William Colbert	Alabama	William witnessed his brother, January, whipped. January never said a word while he was being whipped. Eventually, blood flowed down his chest and he asked for mercy. Sometimes whipped slaves had salt and red pepper rubbed into their wounds.
Octavia George	Oklahoma	Octavia explains how the children were fed on her plantation. They were fed from boxes and troughs just like pigs or cattle. They were fed cornmeal mush and beans.
Louisa Adams	North Carolina	Louisa explains that slaves had 1 pair of shoes a year. If the shoes wore out, then they went barefoot. Her brother's shoes wore out and he had to go barefoot for the winter. His feet cracked open and he left blood stains in the snow when he walked.
